Accreditation Review Commission on Education for the Physician Assistant (ARC-PA), 2018



Programs are **27 months or 3 academic years** (bachelor's degree is required)





To obtain a license, PAs must:



Graduate from an accredited PA program



Pass a certification exam

To maintain their certification, PAs must complete:



**100 hours** of continuing medical education (CME) every two years




A **recertification exam** every 10 years
